## **Kikendall Log Cabin** 2nd Street and Pine Ave.

The Kikendall Log Cabin was built in the fall of 1875. The first floor was 20 feet wide and 16 feet deep. The kitchen area was added on the back around 1895 increasing the depth to 25 feet. The second floor was used for sleeping quarters.

Local residents Susan Bjorling, Haley Rice and Meagan Gray volunteer to decorate the Kikendall Cabin. A lot of research went into decorating the cabin as it would have been decorated for the holidays back in its day.

"Even though it was Victorian times, this cabin was owned by country folk and they didn't have a lot of money to spend on decorations," said Susan. "They would have used dried fruit such as sliced oranges, pears and apples as ornaments with cranberries and popcorn strung throughout the tree.

This historic structure was built in 1938 on the Snohomish High School campus to serve as a music building. In 1983, the Snohomish Historical Society submitted the winning bid of \$116 (the address number) to purchase the surplus music building, and it was Robert and Mary Waltz who donated the funds to move the former classroom to its present location on Avenue B, next door to the Blackman House Museum.

### **Zion Evangelical** Lutheran Church 329 Avenue A 1923

Zion Evangelical Lutheran church is one of the oldest landmarks in town, with its nearly 100-year old sanctuary and soaring white bell tower with a stillworking bell that echoes off the white walls and historic grade school age to the homes surrounding the young at heart decorated site. Chrismons were originated and first made for use on the Christmas tree of Ascension Lutheran Church in Danville, Virginia in 1957 by Mrs. Frances Kipps Spencer. The designs were monograms and symbols for our Lord Jesus Christ. Because these designs have been used by his followers since biblical times, they are the heritage of all Christians and serve to remind each of us, regardless of denomination, of The One we follow. All Chrismons are made in a combination of white and gold to symbolize the purity and majesty of the Son of God and the Son of Man.
